# An interview with Seikilos

#### 1. what inspired you to start the band?

The three things that inspired us the most were wanting to make music that we would want to listen/dance/mosh to, delivering an intense powerful message with our lyrics, and just having a blast playing the songs live.

#### 2. who are your biggest influences?

Our biggest influences have changed a bit over time, we love a lot of the 90's groove metal stuff, like Machine Head, Helmet, and Pantera. However, after befriending and listening to a lot of bands in the Hardcore scene, we started to take inspiration from bands under different subgenres like Drain, Nails, Kublai Khan TX, and especially bands involved in the scene.

# 6. Can you share any memorable or crazy experiences from your live performances or just from being a band?

Every show is memorable, but one that sticks out right now was playing in a shut down D.I.Y. spot called the Barrel Room where there must've been at least 100+ people who were all dancing, headbanging, and even crowdsurfing! The room was so electric, it made us play even harder in return.

### 7. What message or emotions do you hope your audience takes away from your music?

Our message is about not letting people fuck with you or treat you

like dirt, and taking your negative emotions, like anger and frustration, and using it to better ourselves.


### 8. What are your thoughts on the current state of the punk/alternative scene in the dmv?

# An interview with The Dead Queens

#### what inspired you to start the band?

**Alden:** I was just tired of playing guitar in my basement, so I needed to try something else.

#### Who are your main influences?

Alden: Harder answer would be what aren't my influences. My main influences would prob be Van Halen, Alice In Chains, The Cure, Stevie Ray Vaughan, and Queens of the Stone Age

#### what was the first show you played like?

Aidan: Exactly what our Instagram bio says a nice mesh of classic Indie/punk, Modern rock and Heavy Blues, we are hitting the studio in May to record our debut EP, and we cannot wait to get those songs and our art out to the community

### what are some of the biggest challenges you faced as a band?

Aidan: Honestly I'd say communication, sometimes when you're in a band tempers and emotions can fly in ways similar to a family, which from my years of playing in bands I've realized being in a band is similar too that, but just like any family or relationship try and approach everything with an open mind but also speak your mind with honesty and understanding if someone doesn't see something through your lense

### Can you share any memorable or crazy experiences from your live performances or just from being a band?

Alden: We played a house show at a party at JMU, it was going well until I had a string break in the middle of a song, luckily I had a backup guitar until a few minutes a later a string on THAT one broke too so I was at a loss. Luckily the band before us had a guitar he let me use to finish the set. It was one of those cases of what could go wrong, will go wrong, but it was a good experience

Aiden: From my time with The Dead Queens Definitely dealing with interesting characters whether that be other musicians, bookers or venue goers. You can get some really drunk, stoned or flat out weird characters, but ironic enough some of the time those are the people who are always the most into your set

#### what message or emotions do you want your audience to take away from your music?

Aidan: Honestly if you have passion and drive you can do whatever the fuck it is you want, I also want people to take note of the creativity we can put into our own music, it's impressive cause not everybody can do what we (and people in other bands do). Not only that but if you have a voice and a platform use it. We're not a political band but I'm a political individual, we have an original that we mainly wrote for jokes but it speaks from my Leftist and Progressive frame of mind to the current state of the US and what were currently and have been perpetrating overseas for the past 60 years, depending on the venue and the show you'll be able to hear us play our song "Watchlist" live.

# what are your thoughts on the current state of the punk scene in the DMV?

Aidan: honestly we're still a relatively new group so I don't have much to say on the state of the scene other then there are a lot of circles that we haven't broken into yet but with gigs and exposure we can't wait to connect with certain bands and artists we have our eyes on

### what advice would you have for someone who wants to start a band?

**Aidan:** Just do it. Forget what others around you think,

if you have a song, write it.

If you have a riff, structure it.

If you have lyrics, sing them.

But don't half ass it. If you have aspirations, goals, and Talent go for it but be realistic about them and chase them as much as you can

Alden: Definitely start one. It makes you much better when you're playing with others, regardless of instrument, you meet a lot of cool people in the local music scene/venues, and in many cases it takes you out of your comfort zone which I think is important


