## Historical alternatives to performative protests

The classic! Black Bloc is when a very large group get together dressed in all black to protect their identities. It gives anonymity and helps fight against surveillance. Each Bloc is different. At the WTO protests in '99, Black Bloc groups would form "flying squadrons" who would smash windows to get the police to back off of the other groups and chase them instead. This hit and run tactic was used to keep the police in disarray, taking the pressure off demonstrators.



Activism has been more than just parades throughout history! In the fight against fascism and capitalism, we need creativity as much as anything else. Here are some great resources for organization.

In Italy, these all white clad activists would be donning DIY armor under those white overalls. Their armor could be tires, life preservers, or anything that could take a blow. They were at the front of any protest, ready to take a literal beating. At the 2000 Praha IMF protests, Disobbedienti were at the front lines with tires, polls, inflatables, and anything they had to soften the blows from the police.



Up until recently, activists would congregate at a welcome center prior to a demonstration. There, they would give training to newbies, provide food and lodging, and have a place to rest up in after a demo. As rents have skyrocketed and activist spaces have dwindled, welcome centers are slowly becoming a thing of the past. They still serve a vital role in organizing and training. If all of the above makes you feel a little sheepish, consider hosting a welcome center for an action.

The IAA were hactivists who used their creativity and scientific knowhow to build gadgets and setup technological means of subverting the surveillance state. Some of their inventions included the Twitter predecessor TXTMob, i-See – a map of surveillance cameras in NYC, and various "crime-bots" that could graffiti roads and disperse propaganda.
