




PYGMALION'S MONSTER ◊ BY CHARLES

My favorite Greek myth is the myth of Pygmalion and Galatea, in it the sculptor Pygmalion crafted a statue of a beautiful woman— Galatea—and fell in love with her. He prayed to Aphrodite to make her real so he might love her as a living woman, and she did.

One of my favorite books, in a delightful little mirroring kind of way, is Mary Shelley's Frankenstein. The contrast of Pygmalion and Victor Frankenstein—two men who create something beautiful, one falling in love with it, the other rejecting it, is a concept I wanted to explore.

This illustration is inspired, compositionally, by the painting Pygmalion and Galatea by Jean-Léon Gérôme, c. 1890. The monster turns from ivory to flesh just the same as Galatea. Stylistically, it's inspired by book illustrations from the 1800s, just like you'd find in a copy of Frankenstein, or a collection of Greek myths.
